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jasper neel analyzes the emerging field of composition studies within the epistemological and ontological debate over writing precipitated by plato who would have us abandon writing entirely and continued by derrida who argues that all human beings are written this book offers a three part exploration of that debate

this timely book argues that the institutionalisation of literary theory particularly within american and british academic circles has led to a sterility of thought which ignores the

special character of literary art mark edmundson traces the origins of this tendency to the ancient quarrel between philosophy and poetry in which plato took the side of philosophy and he shows how the work of modern theorists foucault derrida de man and bloom exhibits similar drives to subsume poetic art into some higher kind of thought challenging and controversial this book should be read by all teachers of literature and of theory and by anyone concerned about the future of institutionalised literary studies

interpretations of plato stéphane mallarmé and philippe sollers writings in three essays plato s pharmacy the double session and dissemination the english version of dissemination is an able translation by barbara johnson derrida s central contention is that language is haunted by dispersal absence loss the risk of unmeaning a risk which is starkly embodied in all writing the distinction between philosophy and literature therefore becomes of secondary importance philosophy vainly attempts to control the irrecoverable dissemination of its own meaning it strives against the grain of language to offer a sober revelation of truth literature on the other hand flaunts its own meretriciousness abandons itself to the dionysiac play of language in dissemination more than any previous work derrida joins in the revelry weaving a complex pattern of puns verbal echoes and allusions intended to deconstruct both the pretension of criticism to tell the truth about literature and the pretension of philosophy to the literature of truth peter dews the new statesman

plato has often been read as denigrating the cognitive and ethical value of poetry in his dialogues the faculty that corresponds to the poetic the imagination is located at the lowest level of human intelligence and so it is furthest from true understanding simultaneously the platonic dialogues violate plato s own alleged prohibitions against quoting and imitating poets and much of the writing in the dialogues is poetic all too often the voluminous literature on plato dismisses plato s poetic formulations as merely the unintended contradictions of an otherwise meticulous author in praise of plato s poetic imagination asks whether this ubiquitous reading misses something truly significant in plato s understanding of the cognitive and ethical dimensions of human existence throughout the dialogues plato formulates ideas so precisely utilizing carefully crafted images and structures that we must question whether his flagrant and performative poetics can be mere mistakes and inquire into how the poetic and creative arts contribute to true understanding this book approaches the latter question by analyzing the role of the imagination in platonic dialogues it argues that critiquing poetry by poetic means just as arguing against mimesis mimetically in the republic or writing against the written word in the phaedrus constitute performative contradictions that bear significant philosophical meaning on further examination the book suggests that the elusive examples of dialectic referred to in the divided line are the dialogues themselves the putting into practice of ethical ideals if so the role of the imagination is to be sought in the unfolding of the dialogues themselves not simply in what is said but also in what takes place within the dialogues

bridging the gap between interpretations of third way platonic scholarship and phenomenological ontological scholarship this book argues for a unique ontological hermeneutic interpretation of plato and plato s socrates reconceptualizing plato s socrates at the limit of education offers a re reading of plato and plato s socrates in terms of interpreting the practice of education as care for the soul through the conceptual lenses of phenomenology philosophical hermeneutics and ontological inquiry magrini contrasts his re reading with the views of plato and plato s socrates that dominate contemporary education which for the most part emerge through the rigid and reductive categorization of plato as both a realist and idealist in philosophical foundations texts teacher education programs this view also presents what he terms the questionable socrates as teacher model which grounds such contemporary educational movements as the paideia project which claims to incorporate through a scripted curriculum with socratic lesson plans the so called socratic method into the common core state standards curriculum as a technical skill that can be taught and learned as part of the students critical thinking skills after a careful reading incorporating what might be termed a third way of reading plato and plato s socrates following scholars from the continental tradition magrini concludes that a so called socratic education would be nearly impossible to achieve and enact in the current educational milieu of standardization or neo taylorism social efficiency however despite this he argues in the affirmative that there is much educators can and must learn from this non doctrinal re reading and re characterization of plato and plato s socrates

love in the post 2013 is inspired by jacques derrida s book the post card like the book the film plays with fact and fiction weaving together the stories of a scholar of literature and a film director alongside insights from critics and philosophers theo marks works in a university department that is soon to be closed his wife sophie enigmatic and distant is in analysis filmmaker joanna struggles to make a film about the post card these people are set on a collision course prompted by a series of letters that will change their lives the film features a never before seen interview with derrida alongside contributions from geoffrey bennington ellen burt catherin malabou j hillis miller and samuel weber alongside the original screenplay martin mcquillan provides an extended commentary on derrida s original text the film and its making joanna callaghan reflects on her practice as a filmmaker and her engagement with philosophy as a director the volume concludes with interviews between mcquillan and five leading derrida scholars

the classical steven shankman argues should not be confused with a particular historical period of western antiquity although it may owe its original articulation to the literary and philosophical explorations of ancient greek authors shankman s book searches for and attempts to formulate the shape of the continuing presence as embodied in particular literary works mainly from western antiquity and the neoclassical and modern periods of what the author calls a classical understanding of literature for shankman literature defined from a

classical perspective is a coherent compelling and rationally defensible representation that resists being reduced either to the mere recording of material reality or to the bare exemplification of an abstract philosophical precept he derives his definition largely from his reading of greek literature from homer through plato from the history of literary criticism and from the greco roman tradition in english american and french literature shankman reveals unsuspected yet convincing connections among authors of such widely disparate times and places his idea of the classic that authorizes these connections is presented as normative thus making possible the evaluation of literary works and in turn forthright discussion of what constitutes the literary as distinct from other kinds of discourse shankman s study runs counter to a strong tendency of contemporary criticism that argues precisely against any distinct category of the literary he offers a series of interpretations that cumulatively advance theoretical discussion by challenging scholars to rethink the critical paradigms of postmodernism at the center of the book is a discussion of the quintessentially classic val éry poem le cimeti ère marin and the classic qualities it shares with pindar s third pythian ode from which val éry derives the epigraph for his poem

the anti sceptical relativism and self conscious rhetoric of the pragmatist tradition which began with the older sophists of ancient greece and developed through an american tradition including william james and john dewey has attracted new attention in the context of late twentieth century postmodernist thought at the same time there has been a more general renewal of interest across a wide range of humanistic and social science disciplines in rhetoric itself language use writing and speaking persuasion figurative language and the effect of texts this book written by leading scholars explores the various ways in which rhetoric sophistry and pragmatism overlap in their current theoretical and political implications and demonstrates how they contribute both to a rethinking of the human sciences within the academy and to larger debates over cultural politics

first published in 1961 forrest e baird's revision of philosophic classics continues the tradition of providing generations of students with high quality course material using the complete works or where appropriate complete sections of works this anthology allows philosophers to speak directly to students esteemed for providing the best available translations philosophic classics from plato to derrida features complete works or complete sections of the most important works by the major thinkers as well as shorter samples from transitional thinkers

the main focus of interest in this book are the figures of writers and writing subjects in rushdie s oeuvre who contemplate and reflect on the nature and purpose of their craft their authorial identity and their positioning in society and intellectual history though their writing it discusses the aesthetics of the texts they produce and their subsequent agency in the world through the various ways they are interpreted and appropriated authorship is a special category of storytelling a specific craft and vocation giving expression to a conscious and purposeful

project the book focuses on what postcolonial literature specialist dr jane poyner calls the ethics of intellectual practice as the major theme pervading rushdie s entire corpus of writing fictional essayistic and autobiographical the key audience for the book is primarily students of postcolonial literature and of salman rushdie s work in particular it will also be of interest to readers wishing to get a deep insight into the works of one of the most prominent and most controversial contemporary writers

dialogue has suffered a long eclipse in the history of philosophy and the history of rhetoric but has enjoyed a rebirth in the work of hans georg gadamer martin buber and mikhail bakhtin among twentieth century figures bakhtin took a special interest in the history of the dialogue form this book explores bakhtin s understanding of socratic dialogue and the notion that dialogue is not simply a way of persuading others to accept our ideas but a way of holding ourselves and others accountable for all of our thoughts words and actions in supporting this premise bakhtin challenges the traditions of argument and persuasion handed down from plato and aristotle and he offers as an alternative a dialogical rhetoric that restructures the traditional relationship between speakers and listeners writers and readers as a mutual testing contesting and creating of ideas the author suggests that bakhtin s dialogical rhetoric is not restricted to oral discourse but is possible in any medium including written graphic and digital

the author presents a two tiered analysis that views postmodern legal thought as both a collective intellectual movement and as the work of particular theorists notably friedrich nietzsche michel foucault jacques derrida francois lyotard and richard rorty he concludes that even though postmodern thought does not give rise to a normative theory of right that can be used as a framework for deciding cases it can focus attention on genealogy and discourse and can empower those who have been denied a voice in the legal system annotation copyrighted by book news inc portland or

michel foucault refers to 1965 1970 as in philosophical terms the five brief impassioned jubilant enigmatic years this book reinterprets jacques derrida s work from this period most especially in l Écriture et la différence writing and difference and argues that a transformation takes place here which has been marginalized in readings of his work to date irwin follows with a look at how the grammatological opening becomes crucial for derrida s work in the 1970s and beyond incorporating one of his last readings of embodiment from 2000 by drawing our attention to the politics of desire and sexuality this groundbreaking book engages with the work of key continental theorists including artaud bataille nietzsche heidegger habermas and cixous whilst also examining derrida s relationship with plato and feminist theory it will appeal to a wide range of readers within the social sciences and philosophy particularly those with interests in gender and sexuality social theory continental thought queer studies and literary theory

seeks to urge classical scholars to think further and differently about the cratylus and its importance in plato s corpus this work includes an assessment of plato s role in the developing consciousness among greek thinkers of language as an entity for study

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the question of life michael naas argues though rarely foregrounded by plato runs through and structures his thought by characterizing being in terms of life plato in many of his later dialogues including the statesman begins to discover or better to invent a notion of true or real life that would be opposed to all merely biological or animal life a form of life that would be more valuable than everything we call life and every life that can actually be lived this emphasis on life in the platonic dialogues illuminates the structural relationship between many of plato s most time honored distinctions such as being and becoming soul and body at the same time it helps to explain the enormous power and authority that plato s thought has exercised for good or ill over our entire philosophical and religious tradition lucid yet sophisticated naas s account offers a fundamental rereading of what the concept of life

entails one that inflects a range of contemporary conversations from biopolitics to the new materialisms to the place of the human within the living world

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
